A Vision for Youth Education at the Arboretum —Melissa Burdick, Executive Director

Remember the excitement of “field trip day” back in school, getting on that big yellow school bus and going someplace completely new? The magical moment when the bus door opens and a whole new world unfolds at your feet? At The Brenton Arboretum, we get the joy of that magical moment many times throughout the year. As soon as the bus rolls up we hear the muted roar of excited children. We brace ourselves, the door opens, and a tide of rowdy youngsters rolls out brimming with curiosity and wide-eyed enthusiasm. It’s one of the purest joys in this profession to share our love of trees with kids.



Environmental education isn’t easy; capturing attention, encouraging observation, and making connections is challenging. Whether it’s a skittish child worried about “gross bugs” or chronically underwhelmed tween, there’s something special about the power of nature to break through boundaries and open minds to the world around us. That’s why field trips to The Brenton Arboretum will always be free to any school that wants to come.

Over the past year we’ve paid a lot of attention to our youth education programs. We want to teach as many youngsters as possible about the amazing world of trees. It may seem like “more field trips” is the answer; but after thoughtful conversations with educators we’ve found it’s not that simple. Field trips demand a lot of resources, but funding isn’t necessarily the pinch-point. Teachers must ensure students get a certain number of hours of instruction on specific subjects weekly. Taking a day off for a field trip means that those lost hours of instruction have to be made up on other days. That’s hard to do more than once in a year.

We’re also learning that schools put a lot of thought in crafting their curriculum from grade to grade to satisfy broad state standards. Environmental topics may not be in the curriculum at every grade level. A visit to the Arboretum might only fit the curriculum once in a student’s career, whereas field trips to museums, a play, or the zoo are a better fit in other years.

So, how do we get the mission of The Brenton Arboretum in front of as many kids as possible? We meet them where they are. We work with the schools to craft traveling programs specifically tailored to each district’s curriculum. As opposed to a field trip, it’s much easier to carve time out for a classroom visit from an expert to present a program that enriches the student’s learning experience and bolsters the teacher’s lessons.

We also want to forge stronger relationships with our local schools and teachers. We’re exploring opportunities to offer continuing education credits to help teachers integrate environmental science into everyday lessons. By reaching teachers, we’ll impact students too. As a bonus, these closer relationships will allow us to gain insight into teachers’ needs so we can tailor our programs to be as complementary as possible.

Our end goal is always to inspire joy through the beauty and knowledge of the natural world of trees. We want to plant the seeds of environmental stewardship in the next generation of Earth’s caretakers. We hope to play some role, however small, in making the world a better place.

RECORD KEEPING —Andy Schmitz, Director of Horticulture

Record keeping! Who likes record keeping? Maybe you really only have to do it during tax season when you're pulling together all your donation receipts, 1099's and W-2's to complete your taxes but most of my winter months are spent record keeping and I love it. Now, it's not tax stuff. It's gathering hand written notes on trees we planted or died this year, digging through old emails, searching through the yearly overflowing file folder of nursery invoices, printed correspondences and typed up phone conversations, along with rummaging through my brain to gather all I can for the plants we gave accession numbers to this year. Once it's all laying out on my desk, I can compile it into one computer record for each tree or shrub we planted this year at the arboretum. I want to make the records as detailed and accurate as possible such that Director of Horticulture 100 years from now can fully understand what I was attempting to convey about a specific tree. And once this information is in the database, we can quickly search for whatever we are looking for. Maybe that's how many oaks we have planted at the arboretum since the beginning or of the oaks we have planted, how many have died?

So, what fields are in the database? Every tree or shrub gets its own individual accession number, a seven-digit number with the first four numbers representing the year it was planted or given a number in a container and the last three digits are a specific number for that tree. For example, bur oak, *Quercus macrocarpa*, 1997-096 was planted in 1997 and given the number 096. No other tree at the arboretum has this exact seven-digit accession number. The common and botanical name are in the record, along with when it was planted, is it alive or dead, who we received the plant from and where it's located at the arboretum. Notes on the trees health or if someone ran it over with a tractor are recorded along with its growth measurements at planting to see how much the tree grows over the years are included in the database as well. The most important field in the database however, is provenance. For a classic car, the provenance will be, where was the car built?, who has owned it? or was it in a movie? For a rare antique, the provenance will be, how old is it?, what country was it manufactured in? and what is its value? But for an arboretum, especially for wild collected trees we have, provenance is where was the seed which the tree was grown from collected, including country, state or province, locality, latitude and longitude of the collection site along with the habitat the seed mother plant was growing in and the associated plants growing in the area. The collector's name and institution they are affiliated with along with the date they made the collection are also included in the provenance field. Depending on the accession, the provenance can be filled with all sorts of nuggets of information and the more details the better to tell the history or story of a plant.

With all this detail, our database is a wealth of information. Back in March, a colleague sent out an email asking several colleagues, what hazelnut, *Carpinus* species have you tried? With a quick search of our database, I was able to say, we have planted six species over the years. Some have died and some are still alive. One species that has died is the Yeddo hornbeam, *Carpinus tschonoskii*. One tree was planted in spring of 2020 and never leafed out in 2021. Iowa's cold winters could have been the culprit here. This tree was wild collected in Sichuan Province, China at a specific set of coordinates. Knowing its collection location and that the tree died tells us the next time we plant a Yeddo hornbeam the seed source needs to be from a more northern area in China, Japan or Korea. So, dead trees are just as valuable to our work here. By knowing what has died and why, will help us adjust our plantings in the future to hopefully accommodate our ever-changing weather patterns with plants that can tolerate wetter springs, drier summers or the up and down temperatures of Iowa's winters so we always have trees to enjoy.

When you are out to the arboretum this year and you stop to look at a tree and its tag, notice the seven-digit number in the upper left corner and know there is more to that tree. Its history is in the computer database and even when the tree dies, its story will live on forever providing valuable knowledge to the arboretum for centuries to come.

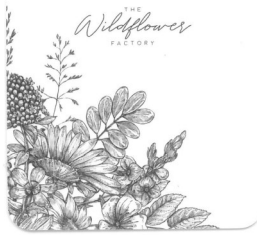

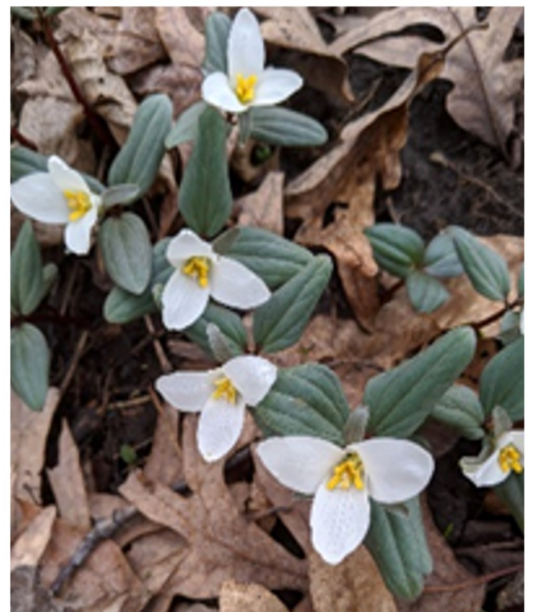

WELCOMING OF SPRING —Penny Perkins, Education & Outreach Manager

Many of us look forward to the new beginnings springtime brings. Ephemerals, the petite flowers that are quick to bloom and fade herald the arrival of spring. This is the perfect time of year to shake off winter's cabin fever and set out into the woods to practice your observation and identification skills on these here-and-gone beauties. Examples of these species are various trillium species (seen in the picture) that get their name from their trio of leaves and petals. Another treasure to look for are spring beauties which host the mining bee (*Andrena erigenidae*), a specialist bee that gathers pollen from the flower to take into the ground feeding the next generation of this specialist pollinator. Dutchman's breeches, toothwort, and May apples also fall within this category of short-lived spring treasures. All of these blooms are utilizing the sunlight that covers the forest floor before the forests canopy's leaves appear. To learn more about the flora and fauna of our spring woodlands stop by and browse our horticultural library. If you'd like to help your little ones learn to observe and appreciate nature too, check out our Kid's Nature Club programs. Every club meeting touches on a new and exciting nature topic to inspire your child's curiosity.
